The political season rolls on! Election day will soon be behind us, and the flurry of political ads, fundraisers and televised debates will subside. Unfortunately, the Candidates' Night we had planned with Wayland and Sudbury never happened, as Representative Markey didn't respond to our invitations. In the meantime, we have a couple of events planned here in Weston.

On Saturday, October 27 at 11:00 am we'll hold our first Coffee Hour at the library of the year to discuss the three referendum questions on the November ballot. Question #1 deals with the availability of motor vehicle repair information, and would require car manufacturers to allow car owners to obtain diagnostic and repair information that is currently available only to dealers. The legislature, faced with knowing this question would be on the ballot, did pass legislation in the spring that went part-way to achieving this goal, but evidently independent repair facilities are not satisfied, and still want this referendum passed. Question #2 is titled "Prescribing Medication to End Life", and will also be dealt with in detail at our upcoming forum on October 30th (see below). Question #3 would legalize the medical use of marijuana. Questions #2 and #3 are currently favored by large majorities in the polls. It would be helpful if you would bring your red booklets sent to each household by the Secretary of State's office for this discussion.

On Tuesday, October 30, from 4:30 to 6:00 in the Community Center Great Room, we are co-sponsoring with the Weston Council on Aging our forum on Death With Dignity. Speakers will include Weston residents Dr. Jim Vernon, surgeon at Newton-Wellesley Hospital, and Jane Brigham, Interfaith Chaplain. Our goal with this forum is to clarify and explain the origins of the referendum, and some of its implications. More details can be found elsewhere in this Bulletin.

We are offering rides to the polls to those who don't drive, and have several drivers standing by. Please give us 48 hours notice if you will be needing this service.

Barbara Flannery and I drove down to Weymouth yesterday for a League Leaders' lunch. Among the topics were the Citizens United Supreme Court decision, program planning for next year, and a collaborative effort with Common Cause to observe the polls on election day to thwart voter suppression.

This is the perfect time to send in your dues and renew your League membership. There's a membership form in the back of this Bulletin you can use. We recently became aware that Inge Uhlir has been a League member for (over) 50 years, starting in New Jersey, so she has been granted lifetime membership and need pay no more dues. BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

Kathleen Rousseau

The LWVW board meeting was held on October 9 at the home of Katherine Wolfthal.

Treasurer's Report: We have slowly been getting in our membership checks. We now have three life members: Inge Uhler, Carter Crawford, and Jean Castillo. Katty will call Polly Dickson to see if she has also been a member for over 50 years.

The Death with Dignity forum will be held on October 30 from 4:30 – 6:00 at the Community Center.

Voter Service: Several of our members have volunteered to drive people to the polls on Election Day. We will not be holding candidate forums because we cannot get both candidates to come to Weston. There was some discussion of whether we could hold such a forum without one of the candidates if there were more than two people running. It is a LWV policy not to do this.

Coffee Hour: October 27 (11:00) at the Library to discuss ballot issues. There will be no experts to present opinion. We are counting on the attendees to present their reasons for their positions and any knowledge that they may have on the subjects. Katty has been to a forum on Medical Marijuana in Waltham. One question is whether the "Right to Repair" issue is really moot at this point.

Beth Keane has found two students from the High School U.S. government class who have volunteered to work with the LWV for extra credit. They must help for 10 hours during the second two semesters of the school year. We are thinking of ways in which we can use their time and talents

Weston 300: Beth suggested that we do our scavenger hunt event during April vacation, and this was accepted. David Hutcheson will make up a prototype of the questions for our next meeting. It will include important locations near Weston Center, some local government questions, and some geographical questions. We are considering whether to carry our LWV banner in the parade.

The Civics Bee will take place in March, in Weston this year. We would like to get the Town Hall for the event if it is not in use.

Moderators Advisory Committee: David is our liaison. It has sent representatives to four local Town Meetings to observe them and make suggestions. In some towns the voters are issued bright flash cards to use in place of a voice vote.

Two different colored cards could be issued. Some members feel that the length of presentations of proposals is too long and have an unfair advantage. Concord has a "consent agenda" which bunches many articles, which seem to be non-controversial and they are voted as a block unless there is significant (5 people) objection.



WESTON TOWN MEETING ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Town Meeting Advisory Committee was initiated by Moderator Wendy Spector after the May 2011 Town Meeting. At that time a number of citizens felt unhappy with how town meetings were run, so this group was formed where problems could be talked over and solutions proposed. There have been twelve meetings. Barbara Hill was League representative for the first 8, and Dave Hutcheson has been on board for the last four. The work of the committee is almost complete. Chair, Tom Crane, will write a report which he hopes to complete prior to November Special Town Meeting.

What happened at the meetings? This group was "open enrollment," any voting age citizen of Weston could be a member. Discussions were lively and wide ranging. Early in the proceedings it was decided that some group members should attend Town Meetings in neighboring towns to see how they did things and report back. People observed meetings in Wayland, Lincoln, Concord, and Maynard. Their reports included the

following: (1) Voters issued bright colored cards to hold up to show their "aye" or "nay" vote. (2) Greeters who welcomed voters and talked up democracy. (3) A town where all town officials were seated on stage facing the voters and answered questions in a neighborly sort of way. (4) A town where babysitting was offered in adjacent school buildings. Weston now does offer this. (5) A town where numbers of warrant articles that appeared non-controversial were bundled into a "consent agenda" and voted in bulk. Discussion only happened if there were five negative votes. Otherwise these items all passed with minimal use of time, freeing up more time for debate of contested articles.

WTMAC finishes soon. Many interesting ideas were expressed. Going forward some of these ideas might be developed further and proposed as changes to our Town Meeting? Or maybe we have become comfortable knowing that things work quite well, and anticipate little or no change? Time will tell!

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Death With Dignity - A Ballot Question

Tuesday, October 30, from 4:30 to 6:00 pm at the Weston Community Center.

On November 6, the citizens of Massachusetts will have the opportunity to vote on a referendum, entitled "Death With Dignity". If approved, it would give permission to physicians under specific conditions to prescribe lethal doses of medication for terminally ill patients. The Weston Council on Aging and the Weston League of Women Voters are co-sponsoring a discussion to explain the ballot initiative. Mitch Finnegan, Health and Physical Education Director for the Weston Schools will moderate the discussion. Panelists will include Weston residents Jane Brigham, Interfaith Chaplain and James Vernon, a surgeon in practice at Newton-Wellesley Hospital with 40 years' experience. An Introduction To **"CONS, SCAMS AND SCHEMES"**

"A scam is limited only by one person's imagination and another person's willingness to participate."

Many crimes of this nature go unreported due to a victims feeling of embarrassment. Often times they will keep these incidents to themselves because they are concerned about how family and friends may perceive them. Many victims may also become angry towards those who offer help or advice. The following pages will hopefully give you some insight into the scams most commonly used today. The best way to avoid these schemes is to educate yourself and understand that there are people in this world constantly searching for ways to steal what you have spent a lifetime earning.

"Good common sense is often times your best protection."

Just to give you some sense as to how many scams there are, here are but a few...900 Numbers, ATM Grab, Advance Fee Loans, Bail Bond Scam, Phony Bank Examiner, Business Opportunities, C.O.D. Scam, Caller ID, Carnival Game Fraud, Chain Referral Schemes, Charitable Solicitations, Confidence Crime And The Banking Industry Cons And Scams, Home Credit Repair, Diversion Burglary, Door To Door Solicitor, Equity Skimming And Real Estate, Fortune Telling Fraud, Gemstone Switch, Government Service Imposter, Handkerchief Switch, Help Needed, Home Improvement Fraud, ID Theft, Imposter Burglars, Internet Email Scam, Investment Scams, IRS Energy Rebate Scam, Jury Duty Scam, Land Sale Fraud, Latin Lotto's, Living Trusts Scheme, Lottery Scams, Magazine Subscriptions, Medical Health Care Scams, Neighbor Assistance Con Nigerian Advance Fee Scam, Obituary Burglars, Pickpocket Diversion, Pigeon Drop, Police Follow-up Scam, Product Demonstration Scam, Pyramid Scheme, Recovery Rooms, Retirement Estates, Rock-in-a-box, Service Technician, Phony Sweepstakes, Sweetheart Swindle Con, Texas Twist, Three-card Monte, Toner Rooms, Travel Scams, Truck Stop Three Card Monte Trust Game, Work At Home Plans, Yellow Page Advertising Scheme,...**and this list goes on and on and on and on and on and on.....**

Where do I go when local law enforcement can't help?

This is the question asked most by victims. While there are numerous government resources available, finding the right agency can be frustrating.

Consumerfraudreporting.org is a free online service to warn consumers and provide a means to report scams and fraud. This site also provides links to all public and private agencies protecting consumers.



DRIVEWAY PAVING SCAMS

As the weather gets warmer and the asphalt paving season begins, consumers are warned to be extremely cautious when selecting a contractor to pave a driveway or parking lot.

Each spring, bands of con-artists, often referred to as traveling criminals or gypsy pavers, enter our state in order to scam unsuspecting homeowners and business

Although little is known about the traveler's history, they all speak in a "cant", a secret language among each other. They have been labeled gypsies or travelers primarily because they travel as families/ groups and because of their nomadic ways. Their favorite targets are senior citizens.

SEVEN ASPHALT PAVING WARNING SIGNS

1. **Selling door-to-door:** Reputable asphalt contractors will sometimes offer their services if they are doing a legitimate job in the immediate area. Always ask for references.
2. **Claiming they have leftover asphalt from another job:** Professional asphalt contractors will know, with great accuracy, how much paving material is needed to complete a project. Rarely will they have leftover material. Some of the reasons a contractor might have left over material are due to weather, equipment problems, cancellations and etc.
3. **Push you to make a quick decision:** Reputable contractors will provide a written estimate that will be valid for weeks or months. If the great deal they are offering you today is not available tomorrow or next week it may be a scam.
4. **No contract offered:** Insist upon a written contract specifying in detail, the work to be performed and the agreed upon price.
5. **Cash only sales:** Most reputable contractors take checks or credit cards and don't require cash-only terms.
6. **Deals that seem to be good to be true:** If the quoted price seems very low, chances are the quality of the work will also be quite low.
7. **Unmarked truck:** Often the trucks they travel in are unmarked or they have an out of town address and phone number. A little research will reveal that they have no permanent address and the phone number is often an answering machine.

A professionally designed and properly constructed asphalt pavement will last for many years and most reputable contractors will stand behind their work. Know who you are doing business with. Consumers are safer dealing with a contractor who has roots in the community. **This scam occurs throughout Massachusetts and typically targets senior citizens.**

HEALTH CARE SCAM

Personal Information Being Asked For Over The Phone

No sooner had the U.S. Supreme Court ruled on the Affordable Care Act than scam artists began working the phones. Claiming to be from the government, they're saying that under the Affordable Care Act, they need to verify some information. For example, they might have the routing number of the person's bank, and then use that information to get the person to reveal the entire account number. Other times, they have asked for credit card numbers, Social Security numbers, Medicare ID, or other personal information.

The Federal Trade Commission, the nation's consumer protection agency, cautions you not to give out personal or financial information in response to unsolicited phone calls, emails, or knocks on your door. Scam artists want your information to commit identity theft, charge your existing credit cards, debit your checking account, open new credit card, checking, or savings accounts, write fraudulent checks, or take out loans in your name.

If you get a call from someone who claims to be from the government and who asks for your personal information, hang up. It's a scam. **The government and legitimate organizations with which you do business have the information they need and will not ask you for it.** Then, file a complaint at ftc.gov or call toll-free, 1-877-FTC-HELP. If you think your identity's been stolen, visit ftc.gov/idtheft or call 1-877-ID-THEFT.

BEREAVEMENT SCAMS

Scammers will often try to take advantage of the increased vulnerability of senior citizens who have recently lost a loved one, such as a spouse. In one recent example, a mother and daughter team in Ohio would find targets by scouring the obituaries. They would then call the widow or widower and claim that their spouse had outstanding debts that needed to be paid immediately. Victims would then provide a blank check or credit card. In another common scam of this type, funeral directors will insist that a casket, usually one of the most expensive parts of funeral services, is necessary even when performing a direct cremation, which can be accomplished with a cardboard casket rather than an expensive display or burial casket. While most funeral directors rarely participate in this practice, individuals should be aware that it can occur.



WORK AT HOME PLANS

'Earn Thousands of Dollars a Month Working at Home!' claims that you can earn a significant income working at home. Very often, there is a catch. The victim is asked to provide payment for information on how to make money by working at home. The victim will usually receive nothing in return or a packet of very vague information. Check these claims out carefully before sending any money. **If it were possible to make the amounts claimed, the scammers would be doing the work themselves instead of engaging in fraud.**

NATIONAL GRID UTILITY SCAM

Suspects contacting victims via phone & door to door

National Grid is warning customers about a new, nationwide utility bill scam that claims the federal government will pay customers' utility bills through a new program. No such program exists, and customers who may be solicited should notify local law enforcement officials to investigate.

Customers have received solicitation through phone calls, door-to-door and online asking them for their social security number and bank routing numbers. Then customers are given fake account numbers to pay their bills. These are fraudulent account numbers and are not accepted by National Grid to pay customer bills.

National Grid reminds its customers that to ensure confidence and security during service calls at homes and businesses; all National Grid employees are required to carry company photo identification. Most, but not all National Grid employees also travel in clearly marked National Grid vehicles when providing service to residences and businesses.

The company reminds customers to always ask to see the National Grid company ID badge of anyone who says they are from National Grid. If you are in any doubt as to whether an individual is a National Grid employee, tell the person to wait outside and call the National Grid customer service number to confirm. Customers are urged to contact us at 1-800-642-4272. **This type of scam is not limited to National Grid. Individuals may use other common utility companies to steal your information.**

Simple Rules To Remember To Avoid Identity Theft While Talking On The Phone.



If they are calling you, never give them any information about yourself or a family member. They should already have it on file.

If you are calling them, then you may be required to give them information for verification purposes.

However, in all cases you should never be asked for, nor should you ever give your password.

“When you call them, odds are better you know who you’re talking to”.

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Quick Reference Guide to Credit Card Fraud and Identity Theft – If You Become a Victim

1.) CONTACT THE THREE MAJOR CREDIT BUREAUS to place a fraud alert and “victim statement” on your credit report. Order a copy of your report from each bureau and review for any inaccuracies.

2.) REVIEW YOUR CREDIT REPORTS and close any accounts you believe have been tampered with or opened fraudulently. (Continue to review your credit reports every six months)

3.) CHANGE P.I.N. numbers and passwords on existing accounts.

4.) CONTEST all fraudulent accounts with the effected financial institution / business in writing and follow up by sending them the Federal Trade Commission’s identity theft affidavit. This form is available on their website at: www.ftc.gov/idtheft

5.) FILE A POLICE REPORT AND GET A COPY. The police report should identify all fraudulent activity. Under the “Police Report Initiative” the credit bureaus will accept a copy of the police report to block any fraudulant account information from appearing on your credit report.

6.) CONTACT THE FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION at 877-438-4338 or online at www.ftc.gov/idtheft They will enter your complaint information into the National Identity Theft database and provide victim assistance and consumer education material. Their website will also provide additional information about your rights as a victim and further explain all the steps you will need to take to repair your good name.

*Repairing your credit may be a time consuming and frustrating undertaking. Keep a detailed log of every step you take. These records will be useful as you contest any fraudulent activity and for law enforcement, if any investigation is conducted.

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


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DEMOCRAT MIKE BARRETT VS. REPUBLICAN SANDI MARTINEZ DEBATE IN SUDBURY ON OCTOBER 15, 2012

Democrat Mike Barrett and Republican Sandi Martinez, candidates for the State Senate seat in the Third Middlesex District, participated in a candidates' forum sponsored by the LWV of Sudbury on October 15 at the Goodnow Library. Both candidates are seeking to replace retiring State Senator Susan Fargo. Because of redistricting, Sudbury is divided and will have two senators representing different congressional districts. Republican Dean Cavaretta and Democrat Jamie Eldridge, who are vying to represent the Fifth Congressional District, which does not include Weston, also participated in the debate. Members of the audience submitted written questions to the League moderator, Helen Marie Casey, who posed the questions to each candidate in turn.

In Barrett's opening statement he noted his experience in the private sector in the healthcare industry and in information technology and his previous experience serving as a State Senator. He expressed his regret that Sandi Martinez had refused the Leagues' invitations to debate in Weston and Concord-Carlisle. In Martinez's opening statement she noted that she was a Republican State Committee Woman, a small-businesswoman in the IT consulting business and that she had children in the military.

Regarding the ballot questions, Martinez stated that she supported the Right to Repair Bill and opposed the Death with Dignity and Medical Marijuana bills, noting that marijuana is a "gateway drug". Barrett stated his opposition to the Right to Repair Bill because of recent legislation addressing the issue and his support of the Death with Dignity and Medical Marijuana bills.

Barrett noted that he had taken no PAC money because he only wants to be obligated to his constituents. Martinez accused him of taking PAC money in the past.

When asked what top three issues each candidate planned to address if elected, Barrett noted the high cost of public education, the defunding of public health initiatives, plugging tax loopholes and extension of the bottle bill to include water bottles. He applauded Mr. Eldridge's desire to record proposed legislation immediately on the internet for prompt review by fellow legislators. Martinez stated that her priorities were jobs, decreasing taxes and the economy. She criticized Barrett's support of a four-cent tax increase on each gallon of gas to improve infrastructure, specifically the MBTA, and stated that the MBTA should be audited because of the many highly paid new hires.

Asked what measures they would take to increase jobs, Barrett identified the area of health and wellness, with the priority of keeping people well, improving public transportation and increasing the number of independent small businesses.. Martinez said that she would decrease regulations and fees, noting that people were leaving the state because of regulations and expensive healthcare.

Asked for steps to decrease state spending, Barrett noted that the State must balance its budget annually. He would eliminate a number of tax exemptions, specifically those relating to soft drinks, private planes and film tax credits. Martinez stated that the Government was "too bloated with employees". She added that she is a founder of the Lowell Tea Party.

Asked for their views as to how much government should help people and whether they shared the Libertarian view of government, Martinez stated that she is a Reagan conservative and that the role of government is to create opportunity and to provide safety for its citizens. She opined that the government is overstepping its role. Barrett stated that he supported all the government that we need but only government that we need. He added that he is pro-choice and in favor of gay marriage, stating that the government had no business interfering with these private decisions.

In closing, Barrett stated that the voters needed more debates to help identify the important differences between his view of government and the view of Sandi Martinez, noting that Martinez refused to schedule any more debates. He noted that the government has a role in supporting basic infrastructure. Martinez stated that we need balance. She is against the gas and bottle taxes and all other tax increases. She is for creating jobs, improving the economy and reducing taxes.
